Today the first of February is the feast of Saint Brigid, one of the three national saints of Ireland (the others are Saint Patrick and Saint Columba). While Patrick was originally a foreigner and Columba was from Donegal, Brigid was a local woman, being born up the road from us in Faughart, near Dundalk. She lived a full life, healing, teaching, helping the less fortunate, working miracles with the help of God, and founding monasteries including the most famous at Kildare. She was known for protecting and encouraging poets, scholars, doctors and nurses, farmers, blachsmiths and anyone who works in the creative arts. She passed away over fifteen centuries ago. Her Brigid's Crosses are still crafted out of reeds and kept in the house to bless the home now as they have been for generations. Her feast day of the 1st of February is the official first day of Spring.


A Year in Review - Niall Minto looks back at 2024 continued
